DEPOSITION *B*Case of *Hester A Bowman*, No. *358469*

On this *2* day of *Sept.*, 1899, at
Baltimore, county of *—*
 State of *Md.*, before me, *N. N. Hill*, a
 special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared.

Henry T. Green, who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special
 examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am *57* years of age; my post-office address is *1724*
Mullikin St. City. Brick-maker.

I enlisted in *Co. A 4 U.S.C. Inf.* July 15-1863,
 and was discharged May 10 1866.

George W. Harris was a member of *Co. C*
same regiment. I did not know him
 until after enlistment. I was first
 acquainted with him while we were
 encamped at *Yorktown, Va.* while we were
 on guard duty there. He was mustered
 out when I was and subsequently we
 belonged to the same *U.S.A.R. Post*. He must
 have lived 30 years after the war here in
Baltimore. He was not a married man
 while in the service, but I do not know
 whether he married after the war.

I never knew his mother or any of his
 people. I do not know whether he had
 any brothers or sisters - I know nothing
 about his relatives.

Yes, he was sick while in the service -
 he was a raw-boned man - looked
 like a consumptive - I used to tell
 him while we were at *Yorktown* that he had
 consumption - he had a cough there and
 looked thin - he was a very dark man.
 I am not certain whether he was
 in that condition when I first knew
 him. He appeared to have a bad cold
