 pension claim, deposes and says: I am about 49 years of
 age, occupation laborer, and residence
 and post office address (No. not given) on
 Frederick Road.

I know William Wells who was a
 soldier and who used to draw pension
 on account of a crooked wrist. He died
 about a year ago in the summer; but
 I don't know the number of the house
 he lived in when he died. He lived out
 on Fulton Terrace, I think. He used to
 White Oak for a living at times. He came
 from the Eastern Shore, and was mar-
 ried. I don't know his wife; but he
 told me he had a wife and two sons.
 One of his sons lives on Queen St.
 I don't know that he was separated from
 his wife. I always understood him to
 say he was living with his wife.
 As near as I can recollect, the last time
 I saw William, he told me his wife was
 sick, and he was trying to get a pension
 for his back. He had rheumatism - so he
 said - and was trying to get more pension.
 I am sure he was a married man; because
 he told me so.
