On this 26 day of May, 1899, at
Cambridge, county of Dorchester
 State of Ind, before me, R. F. Hester, a
 special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared

Anna M. Newman, who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special

I don't know my years of age; my post-office address is Cambridge
Mds.

I knew the claimant's husband - knew him before
 his enlistment - and we always lived in the same
 neighborhood.

I knew the claimant a short time before her
 marriage to the soldier.

Neither were married before their marriage to
 each other.

They were not divorced, but lived constantly
 together as man and wife until his death.
 She has not remarried.

I was present with the claimant when
 the children Walter and the girl Lilly
 were born - but I can not give the
 dates of their birth.

Dr. Goldsboro was present when the girl
 was born - a physician was present
 when the boy was born.

Walter was born in September - and I
 think is 13 or 14 years of age - but I can
 not give the day of the month - and can
 not fix the date any better.

The girl was born in the spring and I
 think will be 12 her next birth day - but
 I can not give the day of the month - and
 am not sure whether it was in March
 or April she was born.
