

DEPOSITION

Case of Martha Woolford, No. 672,765

On this 26 day of May, 1899, at
 Cambridge, county of Dorchester
 State of Md., before me, R. P. Fletcher, a
 special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared
 Eliza A. Henry, who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special
 examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am about 48 years of age; my post-office address is Cambridge,
 Dorchester Co. Md.

I know the soldier Thomas Woolford - had seen him
 since I can first remember - he always lived a
 near neighbor to me, and visited back and forth.

I know the claimant for about a year before her
 marriage to the soldier.

Neither had been married before their marriage
 to each other.

I lived near them - within $\frac{1}{3}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ mile of them - from the
 time of their marriage until his death - and they
 were not divorced, but lived constantly together
 as man and wife until his death.

The claimant has not remarried.

I was present and a witness when they were
 married - I can not remember the exact date
 of this marriage, but it was about 30 years ago.
 They were married by the Rev. Ezekiel Stanley
 "out door at the road at a place they call the school
 house".

I can not fix the exact date of birth of her
 younger children. Not to fix it approximately I
 would say Garfield is about 16 his next birth
 day, and Walter about 13 years of age. I have
 no children about the same age and have no
 means of fixing their age except from memory.

I am not related nor interested, and my answer
 are correctly recorded.
