

DEPOSITION

Case of Martha E Woolford, No. 672, 765

On this 22 day of May, 1899, at
Cambridge, county of Dorchester
 State of MD, before me, R. F. Fletcher, a
 special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared

Mr. E. C. Woolford, who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special
 examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am 21 years of age; my post-office address is Cambridge Md.
 I am a son of the Claimant and live with my mother
 and help work the lot on which we live, and I
 know about her affairs - as I am the one to whom
 the people to whom my father was in debt come
 to transact business,

at the time of my father's death the following
 is the only property he owned.

1st. This house and lot (14 $\frac{3}{4}$ acres) valued at
 about \$400 or \$500, no mortgage against it,

2nd 4 acres and 29 acres of ground near "The Rock"
 valued at about \$6000. a mortgage of \$700⁰⁰
 and 3 year interest against it,

3rd a lot of woods land 76 acres - worth
 not over \$100 an acre, for there is no wood
 in it - and it is worth more to clear it up than
 it could be sold for, as it is low and swampy,
 my mother has only a widow's interest in this
 property.

In the 2nd piece of property, the 29 acres, there
 is a down interest of ~~\$1500~~ Fifteen Dollars
 \$15⁰⁰ per year due Willy Harris.

The only personal property my mother owned
 at the time of my father's death is 2 horses
 valued at appraiment \$50 each and 2 cows
 worth from \$1 to \$2 - One cow was since sold
 for \$13.

at the time of my father's death he had an
 considerable money I think we expended the debts
