Haguetown, County of Washington
 State of Maryland, before me, Thomas Huse, a

Hill, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
 said pension claim, deposes and says: I am about 30 years old.

I am a plasterer, I live here in Haguetown, Md. which is my post office address
I am related to claimant or inter-
ested in his claim for pension.

I was in the band of the 1st Brig.
U. S. C. I. I had the drum and Nelson
Coon played the drums. I was with
him all through the army.

I knew the whole family of
Coon, Daniel Coon the father of
Nelson died here in Haguetown
he was kicked by a horse they
said I know the doctor cut him
up, he was a blacksmith, he was
never in the army he died before the
war I think about a year before
the war.

When we were at Bermuda Run
died, right across from where Genl. Brit-
ter cut his ditch, Nelson, began
to complain and he was badly off
he had the arm, swelled for
one thing and he didn't seem
to get well of it he got pretty
sick at the last of it and appear-
ed like he wouldn't get home
at all but he did make out
