

He was for 2 or 3 weeks unable to do any thing but just lie up and down but he was feeling a good deal better when the Band left Texas for home

I saw him again after I came home and worked along with him, after service, many a time after service and know that he always complained of the scurry afterwards and never was able to do any thing like as much work as he was able to do before the war

His mouth never really got well. Sometimes it would dry up and then it would break out again, but he nearly always complained of pain in his left side and sometimes of headache

I saw and had knowledge of him until the time he died but was not present when he died and do not know of what disease he died, nor the date of his death

I helped to lay him out after death and observed nothing at that time unusual or peculiar in the appearance of the dead body

I have heard this statement read and understood it, and am not related to the claimant or the soldier nor interested in this claim for pension
