DEPOSITION *H*Case of *Mary E. Moxley*, No. *368.984*

On this *eighteenth* day of *September*, 188*9*, at
Hagerstown, County of *Washington*
 State of *Md*, before me, *Wm. Hughes*, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared *Bartley*
Johnson, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid
 pension claim, deposes and says: My age is *52* years, occupation, a
laborer and P.O. address *No 47 East Church St. Hagers-*
town, Washington Co., Md.

I have known claimant and her family for about
18 or 19 years and have lived in the same square with
 them during the whole of that period.

I was a member of Co "D" 39th U.S.C.A. and was
 discharged from service in the summer of 1865. but did
 not know the soldier until several years afterward.

When I did first come here I made the acquaintance
 of the late Joseph Moxley and when talking with him
 he told me that he had contracted the scurvy when
 he was in the army, and he was then complaining
 of his mouth.

But I did not otherwise observe that there was any-
 thing the matter with his mouth then nor at any
 other time afterward.

After I became better acquainted with him shortly after I
 came here, I noticed that he was "shark-winded" and he
 began to fail in health from that time on.

Q Of what did he complain?

A He complained of pain in his back and breast
 and of his teeth being loose and I noticed that
 his gums were sore looking.

Joseph Moxley was never confined to the house
 or bed by reason of sickness during the period of my
 acquaintance with him.

He was always able to be about and to do job.
