

DEPOSITION ACase of Sarah Gale, No. unknown

On this 17th day of July, 1890, at
Unionville near Tunis Mills, County of Talbot
 State of Maryland, before me, R. P. Fletcher, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared the pensioner
Sarah Gale, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of aforesaid
 pension claim, deposes and says: I am about 50 years of

age. P.O. address Tunis Mills Mills
 Md. (P.O. address on pension cty. is probably Easton Md R.R.)
 I am the widow of Joseph Gale
 late of Co B 7th U. S. C. who was
 an applicant for pension, and
 whose pension was granted after
 his death.

The amount of the first check was \$964
 and some cents. and was paid
 last March. (1890)

Joseph Gray (colored) of Easton Md
 had been my husband's local at-
 torney, and he employed some other
 attorney in Washington whose name
 I do not remember.

The check was cashed at the "old bank"
 (National Bank of Easton Md) in Easton Md
 and I paid Joseph Gray \$100.00.
 For what did you pay him the
 One Hundred Dollars?

For the work he had done in proc-
 uring my husband's claim for
 pension.

Why did you pay him that
 amount?

He sent for me to come to town that
 the check had come. I went to
