Case of Annie Ballard, No. 576-865On this 30 day of March, 1895, at
Custom House, County ofState of Baltimore, Md., before me, C. A. HALLEY, aSpecial Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Jarvis
Griffin, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid
pension claim, deposes and says: I was born January 10,
1844. Occupation, water. Residence, 746Ryan Street, Baltimore, Md. I have
known Annie Ballard ever since
she was quite young. Her maiden
name was Annie Benson. She
lived in Cambridge. I first knew
William Ballard who was in my
regiment, in the army. I was in Co.
36 39 U.S.A. and ^{I think} he was in Co.
E. We went away together and
came back together. He used to
tell me he was a Baltimorean.
I don't remember anything about
his being sick in the army.
We were together often as associates
in the army, as often as convenient.
To the best of my recollection he
lived here after discharge till
his death. He had been blind
a year or more when he died.
I don't remember any sickness or
complaint at any time. I did
not see much of him. I remember
that he was walking about the
street some time before he went
totally blind. No, I do not
