Case of Annie Ballard, No. 576.865

On this 21 day of March, 1895, at 106 Welcome Alley, County of Baltimore, State of Maryland, before me, C. A. Haller, a Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Nancy Taylor, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of aforesaid pension claim, deposes and says: I think I am in my 80's.
