

DEPOSITION B.Case of John W. Hayf, No. 747.375

On this 17 day of December, 1893, at  
Baltimore, County of  
Maryland, before me, C. A. Halley, a  
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Aaron  
Scott, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer  
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid  
 pension claim, deposes and says: I, am 51 years old.  
 Occupation, oyster shucker. Residence  
 and postoffice address, 515 W. Mont-  
gomery Street Baltimore Md. I was  
 in Co F, 19, U.S.C. from June 9,  
1864 to January 15, 1867. I am very  
 well acquainted with John W. Hayf  
 who was in Co C, 39, U.S.C. I  
 knew him before the war and  
 also saw him while in the army.  
 I identified him when he made  
 his application for pension. That  
 was at Dorkins oyster house on  
Warner Street. It was soon  
 after the new law passed. His  
 claim was under the new law.  
 The name of the gentleman who  
 took his claim was Rice.  
 The night we were there, there  
 was no other white man with  
 Mr. Rice. I don't remember any  
 other. I could not say whether  
Hayf had any other witnesses  
 or not. Dorkins was there.  
 I do not know Sam W. Pattison  
Notary Public. There was no  
 magistrate there. That was  
 the only time I ever went
