I served during the war in Co. H. 9th Me. Inf.
Enlisted in fall of 1863 and served until Dec
1866. Peter Mitchell was orderly sergeant
of my company. I knew him in Calvert Co. Md.
before the war. He was a strong robust
young man when he entered service and
full right then so far as I know.

I remember that while we were at Deep
Bottom Va. in 1864 Mitchell had some trouble
with his head. He complained of a giddy
feeling and could not hear good. He has
told me that his trouble came from heavy
campaigning in service but I do not know
where. I know that he was very hard of
hearing in service and has been that way
ever since the war when I have seen him.

I know that in about 1875 he was laid up
a long time with Rheumatism but I did
not know of his having Rheumatism in service.
The only trouble he had in service to my
knowledge was his deafness and the giddiness
of his head as he complained. I have
testified for Mitchell. I am a pensioner and
Mitchell has testified for me. I remember
