DEPOSITION *H*Case of *Peter Mitchell*, No. *635,308*

On this *28<sup>th</sup>* day of *February*, 1894, at  
*Baltimore City*, County of \_\_\_\_\_  
 State of *MD.*, before me, *Geo. S. Sidman*, a  
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared *Peter*  
*Mitchell*, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer  
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid  
 pension claim, deposes and says:

In supplement to my former statement <sup>and</sup>  
 answering your questions I have to state  
 that my pension was allowed in August  
 1891 per notice from Mr A. P. Lloyd dated  
 August 13, 1891, which I now hand you. I  
 went to Lloyd's office on Sept 4, 1891 <sup>and</sup>  
 executed my first voucher <sup>and</sup> my check therefor  
 was addressed to Lloyd. When the check  
 came I wrote down and signed it <sup>and</sup> Lloyd  
 paid me the sum of \$32<sup>40</sup> from which  
 amount I paid him 50¢ for executing my  
 voucher <sup>and</sup> cashing my check, leaving me \$31<sup>90</sup>  
 net. (This payment was Ok. Exam)

Knowing that I had applied for pension in  
 1890 I asked Mr Lloyd why it was that  
 I did not have more pension coming to  
 me, <sup>and</sup> he said it was the fault of the  
 Pension Bureau. He promised to write to  
 Washington to fix the matter, but so far as  
 I know he never did anything about it.  
 I spoke to him about it each one time but  
 he "bluffed me off" and said nothing more  
 could be done, <sup>and</sup> I dropped the matter.

I fully understand the contents of this  
 deposition.
