On this 8 day of February, 1922, at Baltimore county of Baltimore City, State of Maryland before me, W. H. Stovall, a Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared George T. Satchell, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

1 I am 81 years old, formerly a cook, and post office
2 address 621 W Biddle st, Baltimore Md.
3 I am pensioned on account of service in Co F 9 U S C
4 Infantry and have lived in Baltimore since 1866 and
5 my home prior to coming here was in Accomac county Va
6 where I belonged to Christopher C. Satchell of Bellhaven.
7 I know this Annie Heath you are asking about and I
8 recollect the day she was born as I went after a granny
9 for her mother, the mother was Emma Satchell of Christo-
10 pher Satchells place in Accomac county, old man Chris was
11 her father, we all had the same owner. Christopher C
12 Satchell owned thirty odd slaves at the outbreak of the
13 Civil War and had children by two colored women of the
14 place and Annie Heath is one of those children. Annie
15 lived in Accomac until coming to Baltimore and she has
16 been here over twenty years and I see her once or twice
17 per year. Her husband was Jacob Heath with whom I was
18 well acquainted. Knew him before his marriage to Annie.

19 Q. How many times has Annie Heath been married?

20 A. One time is all I know anything about and that was
21 to Jacob Heath. I was never at their house. I have not
22 seen Annie Heath since the death of Jacob Heath. Her
23 name was Annie Satchell prior to her marriage to Heath.

24 Q. Had Annie lived with any men prior to her marriage
25 to Jacob Heath? A. She had not that I ever heard tell of.
26 I dont know where she lived for a good bit after the war
27 but on some place in Accomac county no doubt with her mother.
