

amount ever since her pension was granted until the past five weeks. Mr Toulson had this pensioner confined in the Bayview Poor House Hospital for two months and two weeks commencing in February of this year and he did not go to see her nor pay her any money while there and explained it to me by stating that he was paying the hospital for her treatment and it took all the money on hand. There has been no other period since my mothers pension was allowed that she has not received the usual installment of two dollars and eighty cents per week I am able to recall just now. I do not know the service of the soldier Amos Jackson nor the certificate number of this claim. My mother has often said she wishes Toulson removed as her guardian and myself appointed as I have to ^{do} all the looking after her comfort anyway, and he got the position by fooling her and fooling me for we did not understand that the papers he brought to our house authorizing his appointment were papers of that kind or she and I would not have signed them. I have no interest in this claim except to see that this pensioner is properly taken care of by the guardian, and fully understood your questions and my answers are recorded correctly in this deposition which I have heard read.
