We have been asked to represent Mrs. Eliza Jackson, widow of James A. Jackson, late, Private Company H. 19th

United States Colored Infantry in a matter with reference to the pension which she receives under certificate No. 794555 act of April 19, 1908. We are not sure whether this is the number of her certificate, if she has one, or whether it is the number of her husbands.

We are informed that Mrs. Jackson is over seventy years

of age and by reason of infirmities being nearly disabled in both hands from paralysis, it will be necessary that a guardian be appointed to receive her pension. Our Orphans' Court has no jurisdiction to appoint a guardian except for

minors.

We would like very much to help this old lady, as we

understand she is very much in need of this pension and will

appreciate it if you can suggest something that can be done.

Would a trustee appointed by a Court of Equity be satisfactory?
