

all the time at Yorktown and it appeared to follow him up while he was in the service. I was not with him very much after the war. The last time I met him at the Post he had a cold and cough; I cannot remember when that was - it was a good while ago. I did not meet him often enough to know about his physical condition after his service.

No, he was not well at the time of muster out - he had a cough at that time. I do not know the cause of his death. I do not know whether he was buried by the Post or whether the Post has any record of his death. We belonged to Lincoln Post

#7 I know nothing about the marriage of his mother, or whether the soldier left any children.

Abington Green is dead. He married my sister after the war.

I was not intimate with Harris after his discharge, excepting about one year immediately after discharge - after that I did not see much of him. During that year he had that same cough and did not appear to be in good health.

I have made an affidavit in this case I have been correctly reported.
