answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him, deposes and says I am 59 years of age, I was

wood & coal, made and my City address is 549 Moores Alley, I was first drafted, 4th U.S.C.T., from July 1863 to May 1866, I was with my Co. at all times except

2 months from June 1864, I was then in hospital at Portsmouth Va., by reason of wounds rec'd in action June 15-64 at Petersburg Va. I was also detached from

Co. at Raleigh N.C. shortly after General's assassination and done duty at Genl. Duncans head quarters, Raleigh & Goldsboro and Newbern N.C. till

the regt reached Wash. D.C. about Oct or Nov 1865, then ret'd to Co. I am a pensioner @ \$8 per month under the new law I cant now give my

City address, A.P. Lloyd is my Atty. Yes, I know this Clint he is the mother of George Harris who was in my Co. & regt, his term of service

was about the same as mine, Yes he was wounded the same day and place with me, he was wounded in one of his hands he had

the fore finger shot off by the enemy, and he went to hospital at Portsmouth Va. No he was not in the same hospital with me,

The last I saw of him in service was in one of the hospitals at Portsmouth, I was at the Court House and I think he was at

the Ocean House Hospital. I left him there, he was then being treated for his wound of hand. No, I cant remember of any other ailment of his in service, I met him at muster out, No,

I cant say when he was from July 1864 to May 1866. He appeared in fair health at muster out, except he had a cough I first noticed his cough after the raid made by us up to New Kent Co. House

on March 1864, he then contracted cold and ever after that he had a cough, Yes, I made a mistake when I said he had

no ailment in service other than his wound, I am sure he had the cough as stated, and he was troubled with it when I met him at muster out, Yes, he then appeared in fair health

but had the cough, it was a kind of hacking cough and seem'd to be settled on his lungs, Yes he looked like a

consumptive when I saw him at muster out, yes I considered him then in fair health, After the war I lived near him till 1867 I then moved to Caroline Co Md, and did not see

soldier after that, I returned to Balto in 1869 and on my return I found soldier was dead, I never saw him after 1867, but I do know that from May 1866 to April 1867 this soldier

had a cough & appear'd to me as if a consumptive, I cant say as any treatment of his but I surely considered him a consumptive from & after May 1866, I have understood your questions

I may answer how been properly made, Yes I know what death was in my regt but not my Co. Yes he made effort to get out, he & Sarah Baynor

tried to go to app. courts in this case the same day & was each spring at an office near
