 that I know of. My father's name  
 was Mr Fry, - he died of lock jaw from  
 having his arm or wrist and hand  
 being lacerated by being dragged by  
 a cow he was leading it to water  
 Then fourteen of our Children, seven  
 boys and seven girls, I am the oldest  
 There are now living two boys and  
 three girls. - Most of the boys who are  
 dead, died while they were babies. One  
 of my sisters died in confinement at  
 Philadelphia. - Another sister - some  
 said she was poisoned. Another one  
 died, the doctor said, of some trouble  
 of her liver or water. - I never knew  
 of any other member of our family  
 having had epilepsy or fits. - A  
 doctor Isaac Coley of Manassas (hills  
 Balt Co. Md. used to attend to my father's  
 slaves. I don't know where he is now,  
 My health was good at time of  
 enlistment and was examined at  
 camp Belvoir. I don't know the  
 doctor's name, but he stripped me  
 naked and sounded me. My health  
 continued good until the fall of  
 1863, while we were at Williamsburg  
 Va. where I got crippled, in the fol-  
 lowing manner. - Companies I and  
 G. of our regiment were detailed  
 about ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup>
