DEPOSITION G.

Case of Roscoe Wells, No #30,809

On this Twenty day of Nov., 1891, at William City, County of James City, State of Wis, before me, James C. Ely, a Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Charles Campbell, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid pension claim, deposes and says: I am about 49 years of

age, occupation laborer, and residence and post office address (No. not given) on Fredericks Road.

I know William Wells who was a soldier and who used to draw pension on account of a crooked wrist. He died about a year ago in the summer; but I don't know the number of the house he lived in when he died. He lived out on Fulton Street, I think. He used to Whitefish for a living at times. He came from the Eastern Shore, and was married. I don't know his wife; but he told me he had a wife and two sons. One of his sons lives on Queen St. I don't know that he was separated from his wife. I always understood him to say he was living with his wife. As near as I can recollect, the last time I saw William, he told me his wife was sick, and he was trying to get a pension for his back - he had rheumatism - so he said, and was trying to get more pension. I am sure he was a married man; because he told me so.
