DEPOSITION *D.*Case of *Horace Gibson*, No. *536135*

On this *10th* day of *May*, 1888, ~~at~~

 State of *Md*, before me, *Marion Smith*, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared

William Gleaves, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid pension claim, deposes and says: I am now forty nine years old - I am a farmer and day labourer - My P. O. is Easton, Talbot Co. Md. - During the late war I was a private in "Co. B, 7th Regt. U. S. C. G." The claimant in this case, *Horace Gibson*, was a member of this company also. I had known him for ten or fifteen years before the war. We enlisted at the same time. So far as I knew or had ever heard he was a healthy person at his enlistment. I now remember while the regiment was at *Benedict, Charles Co. Md.* in the winter of 1864. We were engaged in building stockades for winter quarters and one night soon after we came to the company camp I heard the claimant say that he had been injured from a fall he had while carrying logs to build stockade. He said that he was injured in his privates but I did not see and have never seen the injured parts. I was detailed shortly afterwards from the company and only saw him occasionally afterwards.
