On this *7* day of *June*, 188*7*, at
Wagontown, County of *Washington*
 State of *Marland*, before me, *Thomas House*, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared *Thomas*
Henry, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
 said pension claim, deposes and says: I am 63 years old the

17 day of next August. I am the
 settler of the First Reformed
 Church, *Wagontown, Md.* ^{and P.O. address} is my residence.

I have known the Coon fam-
 ily for many years I knew Mary
 when her name was Campbell,
 before she married Daniel Coon.
 He was a travelling blacksmith
 I saw him the first time about
 ten years before he married
 Mary Campbell. she was a slave
 on Col. Tilghman's plantation.

I know that Daniel Coon and
 Mary E. Campbell were married
 and had six children I think
 but only one boy that was Nelson
 who died in Washington, some
 years ago.

Nelson entered in the 1st Brig-
 Band U.S.C. T. in Aug 1863. When
 I did he was a young man then
 about 19 or 20 I should say, and he
 appeared sound and healthy
 at the time Nelson entered he
 worked on Andrew Brumbaugh's
 farm about 3 miles from here
 Mr. Brumbaugh, is dead and
