Corporal Co. C. Captain Mearns attached to the 7th
Regiment U. S. C. T. under Col. Pratt, who
being duly sworn according to law, states upon his oath
as follows: In obedience to Gen. Currier dated June
24th 1872 he has used all diligent means to ascertain
the whereabouts of the Officers of his former Co. D. Regt.
but has been unable to do so, as he supposes, by their
removal to parts unknown, and offers to the Department
the evidence of two credible witnesses, formerly in the
service, one a member of his own Comp. & Regt. and the
other, whose Regt. was attached to the same Brigade
which he hopes will be sufficient to meet the requirements
of the Pension Office as he believes it is the best he can
furnish.

At the same time and place personally appeared
Alexander Brown, Corporal of Co. C. Capt. Mearns,
attached to 7th Regt. U. S. C. T. under Col. Pratt.
and Nehemiah Demby, Pri. in Co. K. 39th
Regt. U. S. C. T. under Col. G. P. Stearns, War of 1861-62.
who being duly sworn declare as follows:-

That they know the Applicant, Vincent Demby, for
many years prior to the War, that they were both in
the service as above stated, and distinctly remember
that on or about the 29th Sept. 1864 at the Battle of Fort
Gilmour, Va. Vincent Demby was wounded in the
right arm by a Mini Ball and lost part of the thumb
of his right hand. A. S. Brown was present when
