DEPOSITION A

Case of Lanisa A. Henry, No. 613,878

On this 15 day of Jan., 1896, at Baltimore City, County of _____ State of Md., before me, J. H. McIntosh, a Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Lanisa A. Henry, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of aforesaid pension claim, deposes and says: My name is Lanisa A. Henry, my age is 29 years, occupation domestic and my present address is #824 Hillen St. Baltimore Md. I am an applicant for pension under the old law as the widow of Thomas Henry. I do not recollect the regt. Yes he was a member of the Band 1 Brig U.S. C. T. I have his discharge in my possession. I do not recollect the date of his enlistment or discharge. ^{He was discharged in 1866} I do not recollect of ever hearing that Soldier was in any service of the U.S. either military or naval other than as above mentioned. Soldier died March 29, 1895 at Hagerstown Md. The cause of his death was strangulated hernia. Dr. — Ragan and Dr. — Wareham of Hagerstown Md. attended him during his last illness. Soldier's capture came down about 8 o'clock in the morning and he died about mid o'clock at night. Dr. Wareham was called about 9 o'clock a.m. and Dr. Ragan was called about 7 o'clock at night. The doctors performed an operation in order to reduce the hernia. I think he died soon after the operation was performed. The doctors said that the operation was successful
