



GENERAL AFFIDAVIT.

For the testimony of EMPLOYER or NEAR NEIGHBOR of soldier (other than a relative) who has known him since the date of his discharge and return from the army.
NOTE.—The witness, if not equal to the task of drawing the affidavit, should go to a Clerk of a Court, Notary Public, Justice of the Peace, or other officer or competent person, and have the blank filled out and properly executed.

a Justice of the Peace in and for the aforesaid County, duly authorized

well known to me to be respectable and entitled to credit, and who, being duly sworn, declares in relation to the
aforesaid case as follows: That he has been well and personally acquainted

with George C. Miller for 45 years, and that he is
greatly disabled from performing
manual labor, and that the
degree of his disability is
about one half. And the
greater part of the time he is unable
to do any work at all. And I have been
an associate of his from boyhood and
at present a neighbor of his and
I know those facts to be true. This
affidavit was written by R. King at
Annapolis Md. Feb. 14 - 1894 in the presence
of the witness and from his oral statement
and was not aided or prompted by
any other person, and not attached
as an exhibit to his testimony

Instructions. -- Read Carefully.
The witness must state:
1st. His age, place of residence, post office address and occupation; the length of time he has known the soldier, and in what year or years of the said period he has employed, worked with or for him, or lived in the same neighborhood with him, and how near to him.
2d. If he has employed or worked with him since his return from the army, he should state where it was, and at what business; if he knew him as neighbors only, he should state about what distance from him he lived; how frequently, on an average, each week or month, he has seen him, and conversed with him, and how intimate he was with him during this time, and from what diseases or disabilities he has suffered during all the time he employed him, worked with him, or lived near him, and how severely; giving the common name of each disease, injury or disability; and if an injury, they should state if in the leg, arm, body or head, and on which side, and whether above or below the elbow or knee, giving the exact location and describing its appearance, whether swollen or sore, or as the case may be, and whether at any time during this period he was obliged to stop work, was confined to his bed or house or was wholly unable to do any manual labor because of his alleged disabilities, and give dates as near as recollected when such attacks occurred, how long they lasted and how severe they were. In this connection, the witness should state about what proportion of a sound able-bodied man's work he was able to do—whether $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{3}{4}$, or whether totally disabled, as the case may have been; what his actual earnings were, and whether or not the wages paid him were less in amount, and how much less on account of his inability to labor, than were paid to others physically sound, and doing the same kind of work. He should also state how he is able to judge what his disabilities have been and are now; and should describe fully and clearly the symptoms as they appear to him in his case; in fact, describe fully his physical condition during each year of his acquaintance with him.
