PHYSICIAN'S AFFIDAVIT.

TAKE NOTICE.—The affidavit should, if possible, be in the handwriting of the affiant; and the marginal instructions carefully observed before writing out the statement. All the facts in possession of affiant as to the origin and continuance of the disability should be fully set forth, and the dates of treatment should be specifically given. If the affidavit is prepared from memoranda in possession of the physician, that fact should be stated.

Personally came before me, a Justice of the Peace in and for the
aforesaid County and State Mary L. Butler aged 33 years
whose Post Office address is Hughesville Charles County Md
well known to me to be reputable and entitled to credit, and who being duly sworn, declares in
relation to the aforesaid case as follows:

That he is a practicing physician, and has been acquainted with the above-named soldier for
about years, and that

Erasures or interlineations will not be permitted unless the magistrate certify in his jurat that they were made before executing the paper.)

NOTES.

The Physician's
Affidavit must
show the follow-
ing facts:

Whether or not
he knew the sol-
dier prior to enlist-
ment; the length
of time he has
known him, how
intimately and
what opportunities
he has had of ob-
serving his phys-
ical condition,
whether as his
family physician or
as a neighbor, and
how near he has
lived to him. If he
knew that the sol-
dier was a sound
man at enlistment,
he should so state,
adding, if true, that
had he been un-
sound, he would
have known it.

If he treated
claimant while in
the service either
as his regimental
surgeon or while
home on furlough,
that fact should be
stated. The claim-
ant's physical con-
dition at such times
should be clearly
shown, as well as
the NATURE OF HIS
DISABILITY and
dates of treatment.

If he has treat-
ed soldier since
discharge he
should so state,
giving the date
of first treat-
ment; what his
physical condi-
tion was at the
time, with com-
plete diagnosis
of the disability;
the period dur-
ing which he
treated him
should be stated,
with dates as
near as possible,
of prescriptions,
or visits.

The extent or
degree to which
claimant has been
unable to perform
manual labor dur-
ing each year from
discharge or first
acquaintance to the
present time.

That her name
is Mary Louise Butler, widow of Richard Butler
that her name was Mary Louise Hill when she was
married. That she has from earliest recollection
been called Louise and seldom ever by her
other name Mary. That she is the identical person
(Louise Hill) who was married to Richard Butler by
Pastor Cutting on the 1st Jan'y 1856, and had
lived with her husband ever since until
his death 24 June 1894.

That she makes this
affidavit at the residence of Rufus Robey from her oral
Statement made to him, who wrote it at her request & in her
presence this twenty first day of October 1894 and that she did not
was not aided or prompted by any written or printed
statement or recital prepared or dictated by any
other person.
