

Case of Agnes Wilson

On this 23 day of June, 1921, at near Island Creek county of Calvert, State of Maryland before me,

W.H.Stovall, a Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared Nannie Wilson, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

1 I am 33 years old, occupation housekeeper, and post
2 office address Mutual Md. I am a daughter of James
3 Wilson by Margaret Gross who was never married to my
4 father and my mother reared me but her place adjoined
5 my fathers place and you could ~~not~~ stand in one door and
6 talk to people in the other door. My mother was the
7 widow of Samuel Gross who served in the army and mother
8 received a pension as his widow until her death which
9 occurred on December 9, 1915. My mother Margaret Gross
10 gave birth to four children by James Wilson. He was
11 the father of but one other child and that was Isaac
12 Wilson, deceased, who was by Millie Campbell who is also
13 dead. I of course was thrown with father from my earli-
14 est recollection as he was a close neighbor of mothers.
15 My father James Wilson was twice married and twice only
16 and that was to Agnes Mason of Island Creek Md and to
17 Annie Moore of Baltimore and the latter wife applied for
18 pension as his widow but died before she received it, she
19 died last November at the Colored Home at Crownsville in
20 Anne Arundel county Md but I do not know where she was
21 buried. I dont know where Annie married my father.
22 James Wilson was married to Agnes Mason in Washington D C
23 and before my birth and I have been told that there is a
24 public record of their marriage at Washington. I have
25 known Agnes the past year or so and met her several times
26 in Baltimore where I was employed for two months in the
27 fall of 1920. I have heard of no divorce between James
