Case of Agnes Wilson

On this 16 day of June, 1921, at Baltimore county of Baltimore City, State of Maryland before me, W.H. Stovall, a Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared Agnes Wilson, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am close to 70 years old, occupation cook, and post office address 608 Redwood st, Baltimore Md.

I claim pension as the widow of James Wilson and I do not know his service and have no papers showing his service but he used to get a pension and he died in Calvert county on his own farm not far from Prince Frederick P O going on three years ago, and I have not remarried since his death. I was married to James Wilson in Washington D C not so long from christmas times when I was very near to 17 years old, and the ceremony was performed by a colored preacher, the pastor of Mount Zion Methodist Church in old Stoddard street but I forget his name, we were married I guess with a license procured at the Washington City Hall, and the witnesses to the marriage were Maria Wheeler, Lizzie Fisher who was my brides maid, and that is all. The marriage took place in the house of Maria Wheeler in Georgetown or West Washington in Stoddart street.

I do not recall that the minister gave us a marriage ctf. If he did my husband tore it up. I lived with James Wilson as his wife for five months and in Calvert county Md and then we separated because of Wilson putting me out of the house and taking another woman in in my place, her name was Sallie Curtis, now deceased, and I never lived with Mr Wilson since that time and have seen him but once which happened down there in Calvert county thirty or forty years ago. I have not been divorced from James Wilson. Since we separated I have lived in this city and been supported
