

sworn me. I do not know his name nor can I describe him now. I have no recollection that I swore for one for Frisby. I did not go with him when he applied for pension. I think, now that you ask me that I went with Frisby and another man to the Superior Court in St Paul and Lexington St. I have been to that office twice I think. There was high steps going up in that office. I am now sure that I went there twice to identify comrades, but I cannot say whether I went there for Frisby or not - for sure, but I may have done so. Chas. H. Syc (now dead) was in my Co. and he was there with me once. I do not now remember who took us to the Sup^r Court. That was more than 3 years ago I know. Yes, I was sworn both times I was there by a man in the office whom I do not know. It seems to me now, when you ask me, that I was sworn to a paper for Frisby by a Magistrate in St. Paul near Arch. (McCawley) but I do not remember the nature of any testimony there. I think it was as to his disabilities since the war. I have no knowledge that Frisby was wounded in service. I think he was in the battle of Petersburg - July 30 1864 - but I do not remember that he was wounded there. We had several men of my Co. killed and wounded there, but I cannot remember who all they were. Having heard read the report of Nov 10/90 I must say that I have no knowledge that Frisby had any of these disabilities in service or read off. I know he was sick and ailing & d
