I knew Benjamin Frisby  
 ever since he come home from the Army  
 and continuously up to the day of his  
 death. The war of the rebellion was  
 not over when he come home.

At I knew Henrietta Frisby, the wife  
 of Benjamin Frisby before he returned  
 from the Army, because she and her  
 children were living with Old man  
Perry Frisby, Ben's father, here in  
 this City.

She told me that  
 when her husband Benjamin Frisby went  
 into the Army, he wrote to his father  
 to come after Henrietta and the children  
 and keep them at his house till he  
 (Benjamin) got back from the war,  
 and he did bring them here to Balti-  
more and they lived with Old man  
Perry Frisby until Ben got home.

I knew Henrietta and all her chil-  
 dren well. I lived in the same house  
 with them two or three years.

They come from the Country someplace  
 but I don't know where. I never knew  
 any of them till they come to Baltimore  
 to live. After Benjamin Frisby came
