Case of Benjamin Frisby, No. 738989

On this 8th day of January, 1902, at Baltimore City, county of Baltimore, State of Maryland, before me, A. H. Davis, a special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared

Edward Wooden, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says: I am about 69 years old, occupation Messenger and my residence & P.O. address is No. 35 Carlton St. Baltimore, Md.

I was a private and Corporal of Co. A, 38th Regt. U.S.C. Vol. Inf. I became acquainted with Benjamin Frisby and his wife Henrietta Frisby, as soon as I was discharged from that Company, and have known them ever since that time.

Ben Frisby and his wife were living with old man Perry Frisby, Ben's father, when I first got acquainted with them, and I and my wife had rooms and lived in the same house.

So far as I know they lived together as husband and wife continuously from the time I first got acquainted with them till the day of his death.

I never heard of their separation, if they were ever separated. I saw Benjamin Frisby occasionally during all that time, and was at his house once.

I don't know when Ben Frisby died, and have not seen Henrietta, his wife since his death.

I know of no property that he had, and don't know whether he left any to his widow or not.
