Splitting a Second.

An instrument has been constructed in Berlin, Prussia, by which the 1,000th part of a second can be measured and registered. The instrument is very large and is so heavy that six horses were recently required to transfer from one part of the workshop to an-

The mechanism of the contrivance similar to that of a large tower clock. The speed of the revolving hand is so great that the hand can not be seen when it is in motion, and it is photographed automatically as is the cannon ball whose speed it is required to meas-

When the ball is discharged from the annon it passes through a wire netting, and at a certain distance through another netting. These nettings unlock and lock the conductors of an electric instantaneous photographic apparatus. The position of the hand of the in-

strument at the instant the ball leaves the cannon, and again when it reaches certain point, can be read from the The movement is controlled by an

electric connection with a pendulum regulator, which exactly registers the time consumed by the cannon ball in its travel, measuring one-thousandth of a second. - Jewellers' Weekly.
