COYOTES ON A RABBIT HUNT.

Two of Them Relieve Each Other in Running Down a Meal. The coyote is a more intelligent, sharp-witted beast than his big cousin, the gray wolf, says a writer in the Philadelphia Times.

It is stated by reliable eye-witnesses. that the covote, in order to secure a dinner of jack rabbit, and probably rea soning that one rabbit will make a meal for two wolves, enters into an arrange ment with a brother coyote to join him

in the hunt. No wolf can singly run down a jack rabbit, and if the latter should run in a straight course, no number of wolves could possibly catch it; but the rabbit nearly always runs in a wide circle, because it is its nature to return to its native slope or pasture. Accordingly one of the two coyotes hides himself near the spot where the chase begins, while the other pursues the rabbit at the top of his speed. Away they go, the rabbit gradually curving his course and finally coming back to the starting point. Now the tired coyote rests, and the fresh one springs out of hiding and takes his turn at swinging around the circle. If the rabbit has wind enough to outrun the second wolf, the first one takes another round, which is usually enough to wear out poor jack, and the cunning coyotes have earned their dinner. It has been known to happen, the circle and made a long, straight run, whereby the pursuers "got left."

But you must not infer from what has been said that the coyote is a slow runner; on the contrary, no dog, except the greyhound and the famous Russian wolf hound, can outrun him. Even after overtaking him, no single dog could master the wolf, whose agility and fighting qualities are so well developed that the dog would soon retreat from the contest. I have known two powerful dogs to rush from our camp in Southern Texas and attempt to drive a covote from its meal. It was a complete failure. There was a tremendous snarling and gnashing of teeth, and soon back into camp, one of them severely bitten in the neck and shoulder. Three or four wolfhounds and Siberian blood. hounds could doubtless kill a coyote, but if less than six of them should unite against a big gray wolf they would be glad to draw off before the wolf had been much hurt.

Where Honesty is Appreciated. Truthfulness is at a preminm i Persia, as the American or English resident soon discovers. For some time after his arrival he is the victim of his servants, of the tradesmen, and indeed, of the natives in general. He buys experience more or less dearly, but having bought it he is able to correct his mistakes one by one. Gradually he takes root in the country. He "hits off" with the Persians. The solitary one makes friends-real friends, not mere acquaintances-and, strange to say, those friends are often from the priesthood, the most fanatical among the Moslems. And these Oriental friends always confess that what originally attracted them to their new ally is the strange fact that he does not lie. In that great hotbed of falsehood a man who speaks the truth is a phenomenon. Very soon he is invited to dinners, to marriage feasts, even to picnics; for he is a lion, and the lionhunter exists even in Persia. Little by little the influence of "the man who tells the truth" begins to spread, disputes are referred to him, for is he not the only judge in the place who does not hunger for a bribe? An unpaid arbitrator, he "embodies the law" in many a knotty dispute. There are no fees in his court, and the reference being by mutual consent and purely unofficial, there can be no appeal.

Defective Teeth. The physical defect of Americans in possessing bad teeth, or none at all, is declared by Dr. Woods, of Pittsburg. to be due in great measure to the faulty kind of food given to children—the importance being primarily to select food that requires mastication, as this tends to develop the gums and salivary glands, while the practice of giving too much liquid food causes narrow jaws, weakens the gums and mars physical beauty; then, too, the small, thin jaws, consequent upon a liquid diet do not furnish room enough to accommodate the teeth, even were the blood supply sufficient-the teeth, thus crowded, failing to receive adequate nourishment, a most potent cause of defect in the enamel and consequent caries. Mastication, Dr. Wood remarks, is the important point—and so true is this that, if proper care were taken of the diet of children, Americans would be physically the strongest people on earth-surpassing in development and beauty the ancient Greeks.


