April 24<sup>th</sup> 1735. Jacob Wooters declared that his Father told him that the Bounded Tree of Holm Hill stood on the North side of a little Branch that is now in the plantation of John Robins and upon a point at the mouth of said Branch it being a Red Oak and that about nine years ago he saw one John Williams fall the said Bounded Tree and that he told him it was the Bounded Tree of Holm Hill at this time their is the and body of the said Tree seen by us the Subscribers and that we was present when the above said Jacob Wooters made this declaration in Testimony of which we saw him sign this his said declaration ~~in presence~~ there is now growing by the Stump of the said Bounded Tree a Honey or Black Cherry Tree.
