Depositions of James Plummer and Francis Baker on boundaries of Smith Cliffs, Talbot County

Mr. James Plummer, upwards of Seventy Years of Age, says he has lived where he now is, upwards of thirty Years, that he never saw any Boundaries to these Lands, more than a large Stone standing not far from Capt. Barrows landing, which Stone Mr. Francis Baker conceives was put in the place where the Cedar post was fixed as mention'd in the Depositions of William Dobson and Jn. Libby. — Mr. Plummer further says that a few Years back, in running the division line between Jenkins and Thompson, that they started from the afo^e Stone, and came out to the Road between the point of Woods of Capt. Barrow, and Mr. Hardcastle's gate, and so continued their Course through the Field of Mr. Hardcastle where his Barn now stands. — Mr. Plummer sets forth further, that some Years back, he was inform'd by a certain David Harrington, of a Boundary standing on Horse point, which Boundary Harrington said was a White Oak, such as is call'd a Carpenters Oak, but that he never went with Harrington to the Boundary, Neither to his knowledge did he Ever see it. —

Mr. Francis Baker informs, that about Twelve or Fifteen Years ago, he was on a Commission to perpetuate the Bounds of the following Tracts of Land Viz. Chennutt Bay, Hassogreen and Smiths Cliffs, and that he thinks he can show the Bounds then Established. —

John and William Sylvester, are Sons of old John Sylvester. — It is probable they may know something of the Bounds of these lands, being Born & raised here. —
