

I hereby certify that I have carefully surveyed and laid down as part of the real estate of the late Lloyd Silghman a tract of land called Chance, situate, lying, and being in Talbot county on the west side of St Michaels alias Orles river, beginning at a stone standing near the mouth of a creek called Swan Creek, it being the first boundary of said Chance and running from thence with the lines of said Chance $31^{\circ} 15'$ west 50 paces then South $1^{\circ} 30'$ east 129 paces to a marked post south $59^{\circ} \frac{1}{2}$ paces to a stone, then E. S. E. $214 \frac{1}{2}$ paces to a cedar post, then north $29^{\circ} 52 \frac{1}{2}'$ west 22 paces to a marked cedar post on a hillock at the roots of two pines and one oak, then S. E. 68 paces to a cedar post in a marsh, then N 79° E 8 paces, N 49° east 7 paces to a stone set by the side of said river, running down said river and bounding therewith to the mouth of Swan creek, and with said creek to the beginning, containing and now laid out for 223 acres of land more or less.

Lines of part of the tract of land called Newport to be conveyed from Edward Hambleton to John Silghman. Beginning at a cedar post standing at the end of the E. S. E. line of a tract of land called Chance running from thence with said Chance N $29^{\circ} 52 \frac{1}{2}'$ west to a marked cedar post on a hillock at the roots of two pines and one oak, then S. 70° E. 21 paces until it intersects a line drawn N $36^{\circ} 15'$ E. from the beginning and from thence with a straight line to the beginning, containing $3 \frac{1}{2}$ acres

Lines of part of Williston or Hambleton's addition to be conveyed to John Silghman, beginning at a stone near the mouth of Swan Creek, the beginning of said Williston runs N $31^{\circ} 15'$ E. 18 paces to St Michaels river, then down said river and bounded therewith N 95° W 3 paces to Swan creek, then up said creek and bounded thence S. 19° W 6 paces, then S 20° W 9 paces, then S 79° W 9 paces, then 18° W. 12 paces then S 49° W 8 paces, then S 16° W 10 paces, then S. W. 8 paces then S. 6 paces, then S. W. E. 3 paces, to the first line of a tract of land called Chance, then with said line reversed, straight to the beginning, containing $1 \frac{1}{2}$ acres of land more or less.
