

IN ORDERING these medicines, if for failure to breed, it is well to state the case, as in many instances much time, if not disappointment will be saved in consequence. The name, (number if registered,) age, date of last progeny, number of days between heats, if too frequent or infrequent, or if skipped occasionally; if the os. is closed or congested, or if relaxed; if any discharge exists and the nature and time of it and any other trouble. All these should be mentioned, so that if any auxilliary vial is needed to facilitate a speedy cure it may be shipped at the same time without extra charge. To examine the os. when the animal is in heat, a pail of warm water, a towel, a little Castile or other similar soap on your arm is all that is required, and you should be through in 3 minutes, with as little irritation as possible and no forcing open should be allowed.

PREVORTIO.

The value of this medicine is too little understood. Every breeder should have it on hand. For sterility from relaxed os., downfall of the calf-bag, protrusion of the womb and threatened abortion it is a prompt and sovereign remedy. The testimonial of J. J. Jennings refers to a case of protrusion of the womb. Abortion was feared. Prevortio effected a complete cure in a week. I will mention a case of a cow that had aborted two years in succession when seven months and one week advanced in pregnancy. I directed the herdsman to give 15 drops of Prevortio once daily, commencing when seven months had expired whether symptoms appeared or not, and continue this treatment for 3 weeks. He done so and no symptoms appeared, but when 8½ months had expired, the udder and vulva commenced to swell and a premature birth seemed imminent, and the herdsman was instructed to give 15 drops of Prevortio daily until parturition. This was done and the swelling at once subsided, and the cow finally dropped a large, healthy calf which she carried 9 months and 12 days. No other medicine was given. For *Prolapsus Uteri*, or bearing down in women, it is absolutely unapproachable by any rival medicine in the *Materia Medica*.
