*Dear Sir*:—Last Fall I sowed one-half of 25 acre field of wheat with S. C. Bone, and the other half with S. C. mixed with Retsof "C" Salt, one-half of each, and would say that the mixture has produced decidedly the best wheat on the thinnest portion of the field. There also seems to be a fair stand of grass which heretofore there has been a great deal of trouble to get a stand. Also, on one corn land "salt" was sown broadcast and then the mixture.
