## A Peep Into Vermont Stables.

EDITOR AMERICAN HORSE BREEDER:

As winter is approaching, and all the fast horses are safely stabled. I will speak of a few good ones in this section of Vermont. As you well know, the horse owners here are not millionaires, and most of them have to breed on a small scale.

Lambert B. goes into winter quarters with a mark of 2.221, and is as game a horse as ever answered to the call of the bell. I personally timed him in a race the last half in 1.07% on a half-mile ring.

Lyndon Boy (2.26½) is looking finely. I called on his owner last week, and was greeted by one of Hen's genial smiles, when I asked to see the boy. He stripped his blanket from him for my inspection. This horse does not show the hard work he did during the season just closed. He started five times, and took part of the money in four of the races. There is a mistake in the breeding of his dam, as gen erally given. She was not by Streeter, but by the Dunbar Hoyt horse, and he by Vermont Ranger 7436. I will lay the facts before you soon. This mare died in the winter of 1892 from the effects of a broken

The sire of Lyndon Boy was Black Morrill, by Vermont Ranger 7436, so you will see he is an inbred Morrill. The dam of Black

Morrill was by Ford's Black Hawk. Mr. W. H. Chase has some good ones by Alcander (2.20½), Lambert B. (2.22½), Jingle (2.283) and Cobden (2.283). Some of them ought to get there.

C. E. Sisco has a filly by Cobden Jr. (2.15) and L. A. Brown has a three-year-old stallion by the same horse.

As a general thing horses are quite low at present, but horsemen think there is a better outlook ahead.

Many breeders here still adhere to the Morgan class of horses, and you can see at any time some of these stylish horses either at work on the farm or hitched to a carriage.
