Head of the 28th Decr 1779

your favor of the 23rd is now before me am very sorry
Mr Curry has ^{been} detained, which was occasioned by my being in
Harford when he came up, am the more so as I am under
the necessity of disappointing you in the Morney, yesterday
coming my Express came in from Philadelphia when he
had been several days waiting for morney only. He has
brought me a Draught on the ~~Bank~~ Treasurers for 250.
thousand Dollars, which it will be some time before
I can possibly receive as he is to send for, and I fear he is not
in the Treasurers, but he will send of the Express again to-
morrow and as soon as the morney ^{comes} shall immediately
acquit you the Balance which I now give you by Mr
Curry an obligation for in order to have the account
settled. This account should have been long since settled
had not I expected that the grinding of wheat to be
settled with you, and was refused to wait on the
Millers for their accounts and Invoices with regard to
thes and the accounts of Cash. Nails. &c. I was not till
a few days before Mr Wright went down last, and
then I requested of him to take the accounts down and
settle them that I might know what the Balance
was, I am sorry for the Deputation can only say that
I have a fellow feeling for you. as to the Commissions you
shall have every thing that can be allowed you, all that
your accounts will pass with you shall as speedily have,
but tis out of my power to allow such accounts as will not
pass with the auditors. The Balance Due shall be sent
