

Dorchester 20th Sept 1821

Sir

Not having heard from you in reply to my last letter, being an answer to yours of the 20th April 1820, I have concluded, that under the excellent regime, of the Post Office department, it has never reached its destination. I therefore again address you. In referring your Statement of Feb. 15th 1820. I find you make a balance due me, after paying the claims of both Postleworth & Lewis in full, of \$94.02 which you state is in the hands of Judge Turner the Admin^r of Mrs Griffith, on account of the hire of Negro Harriet for the year 1829 - and which he had promised to pay in the course of a few days. This Bal. you have omitted placing to my credit in your Statement of the 30th April last; and I also perceive a difference amt received for hire for 1820 - of \$30, being so much less than the sum you mentioned you had hired them for in that year - This error I presume arises from your charging me with the sum of \$30 for medical attendance of the Negroes hired to Williams; whereas it was deducted from the hire and ought therefore not to have been a charge against me, in as much as I am credited for the actual amount received and not the sum for which they were hired. Instead therefore of there being a Bal. of \$45.00 against me after satisfying Pheas claim it ought to have been in my favour for the
