

her mother's  $\frac{1}{4}$  or  $\frac{3}{12}$  of his estate. To equalize their shares he takes away from Helen Owen  $\frac{1}{2}$  of her mother's  $\frac{1}{4}$  leaving her  $\frac{1}{8}$ , and divides the other  $\frac{1}{8}$  into three equal parts, and gives  $\frac{1}{3}$  of this remaining  $\frac{1}{8}$  or  $\frac{1}{24}$  of his whole estate to each of his other grand-children, the children of his deceased daughter Elizabeth. This Your Honors will perceive, equalizes the portions of all of his grand-children. Helen Owen, after dividing her mother's portion, has  $\frac{1}{8}$  of his estate, each of his other grand-children, by adding the  $\frac{1}{24}$  which is given to each of them from Helen's share to the  $\frac{1}{12}$  which they previously had, have each  $\frac{3}{24}$  or  $\frac{1}{8}$  of his estate, the same as Helen. The testator's intent that the Respondent's half of her mother's portion of his estate, should be given over to her directly; that no one should interfere between her and the full enjoyment of it, is further shown by the mode in which he disposed of the other half. He leaves the Respondent's half to her "during her nat-
