Richard Peacocke assigns 125 acres - Emory's Neglect - being part of a tract of 4000 acres granted to Peacocke - who was deputy surveyor under Vincent Lowe, Surveyor General.

It lay in Talbot on the main branch of Wye River, being the first bounded tree of a parcel of land called Butterfield formerly laid out for Giles Butters - and running with said land north-east to a

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parcel called Vanderford: then north-west with said land - 195 perches - and then South by west 265 perches to a parcel called Green Spring: then north-east 70 perches to a marked white oak standing by the branch side being the first bounded tree of the said land called Green Spring and from thence by a straight line to the first bounded tree - 125 acres - to be holden of the Manors of Baltimore.

Certificate of Henry Parker Surveyor - that he had laid out 50 acres of land assigned to Arthur Emory from a grant of 2000 to Robert Smith -

Parcel called Emory's Addition lying at head of Wye River - above the bridge beginning at a marked hickory tree on the lower side of the road by his plantation, standing in the line of Blangee's Land -

N. W. 56 perches - S. W. 160 perches.

S. E. 50 perches to Emory's Land.

Emory Paxton - lying upon the branches of a branch of Wye River called Thomas's Branch, between Walker Square, Manchester + Col. Lloyd's Land. It adjoined Hugh Paxton's land, Manchester, and part of the ~~land~~ ^{line} ran East to the road which led from Wye Mill to Chester Mill.
