This deed conveys part of tract called "Tilghman's Addition," 100 acres.

Part of tract called Adventure 7a,

"Adventure 34a," adjoins + part of above conveyed to grantor by Charles Cobb.

Emory's charge, received by grantor under patent from his Lordship to him Oct. 19, 1773, remaining in Land Office.

"Security", 5 1/2 a., Patented to grantor Oct. 6, 1769.

"Emory's Discovery", " " Oct. 19, 1773.

"Bite the Biter", " " grantor Nov. 3, 1769, containing in the whole 169 acres -

Above shows that all the above tracts were adjacent one to the other, and according to Bill of Marsh
