

He was a man of great reserve but those who knew him loved him and men working with him admired and respected him for his depth of understanding and the sincerity with which he took hold of the job on hand. Whatever he achieved in life, he gained by his own determination to succeed and engineering was his great hobby as well as his life work though he had a wealth of information on many subjects and a great interest in out-door recreations.

He had been engaged in work in Europe for some months previous to his death which came rather suddenly in Barcelona, Spain on January 5, 1931 following a severe attack of influenza.

He married June 2, 1924, Alice Martens of Wilmington, Delaware, who with one child, Lloyd Tilghman Emory, Jr. survive him.

Mr. Emory was elected a Junior Member of the American Society of Civil Engineers on Oct. 5, 1909, and Associate Member on April 2, 1912 and a Member on January 20, 1920.
