

to counsel for the respondent that he proposed to take testimony of witnesses in Europe, it such testimony could be secured through the processes of the Commission. That he would move the Commission to order the taking of this testimony upon oral interrogatories. A motion to this effect was duly submitted to the Commission in memorandum of the Chief Counsel of the Commission, dated February 9, 1937, and memorandum of the Commission's Trial Attorney, dated February 18, 1937, and the Commission on March 21, 1937, heard oral argument from counsel for the Commission in support of the request for the taking of this testimony in the manner indicated and from counsel for the respondent in opposition thereto, and on March 28, 1937, denied the request for the taking of oral testimony in Europe. Thereupon Chief Counsel for the Commission moved the Commission that depositions in support of the allegations of the complaint of certain persons residing in Europe, taken upon written interrogatory and cross interrogatory, and this motion was set down for formal hearing by the Commission and it was duly heard on April 14, 1937, counsel for the Commission and counsel for the respondent submitting oral arguments and counsel for the respondent submitting a brief. Because of the prior participation of counsel for the Commission in a prosecution in another case, he had been unable to prepare a brief immediately preceding this hearing.
