

LLOYD T. EMERY

was called as a witness on behalf of the Commission and
having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. WHITELY:

Q Will you give your name to the reporter for the record?

A Lloyd T. Emery.

Q What is your profession, Mr. Emery?

A Why, that of an engineer.

Q Will you please state as concisely as possible your

technical education and engineering experience since

graduation?

A I graduated from the Toms Institute in 1904 and have
what is known as a technical course in 1908, after graduating

from the University of Pennsylvania with a degree of

Bachelor of Science or civil engineering. In 1911 I

received a degree from the University as Civil Engineer.

My first work after leaving college was with the Pennsylvania

Railroad on their tunnels under the Hudson River. This

work lasted approximately a year, after which I went with

the Kaelin Mining Company of Philadelphia, in the capacity

of engineer and general superintendent. This work con-

tinued until January, 1911, when I resigned from the company

and entered the firm of Emery and Elsenberry.
