The wheat throughout the county was very much ^{damaged} ~~taken~~ by the drought in May, but the recent rains have helped out wonderfully, and I should not be surprised if the crop were not almost as soon as an average.

As I told you in a previous letter, there will be no peach crop, and I do not expect anything from the hay.
