Dear Edward:

I have been away from town a good deal this week and have not had the opportunity to write you as promised.

I went down to Maryland on Tuesday and looked over the farm. The money for the tomatoes has been coming in very slowly, and I have not been able to send the check to General Carter. I expect to do so before the end of next week. This check will be for \$94. The remainder will have to come out of the corn crop, which I estimate should bring somewhere between \$450 and \$500.

I have talked to one or two people on the subject of mortgages, and it seems customary to let them run on after the date on which they expire.
